- ITEM 1. CALL TO ORDER.** Mayor Agenbroad called the Springboro, Ohio City Council Work Session to order on Thursday, August 4, 2022 at 6:00 PM in Council Chambers at the Springboro Municipal Building, 320 W. Central Avenue, Springboro, Ohio.
- ITEM 2. ATTENDANCE. Council:** Mr. Hanson was absent. **Staff:** Mr. Pozzuto, Mr. McDonald and Ms. Martin were present. Mr. Shackelford was absent. Police Chief Kruithoff and Finance Director Jonathan Hudson were also in attendance.
- ITEM 3. LEGISLATIVE AGENDA. – Review legislative items slated for August 4.**

- 1) **EMERGENCY ORDINANCE: FIRST READING.** AN ORDINANCE DETERMINING TO PROCEED WITH UNDERTAKING IMPROVEMENTS AND PROVIDING MAINTENANCE TO CERTAIN PROPERTY IN THE CITY OF SPRINGBORO, COUNTY OF WARREN, OHIO, AS DESCRIBED IN ORDINANCE NO. 0-22-17 AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY. (HEATHERWOODE SUBDIVISION)

Staff requested that Council waive the second and third readings of Legislative Items 1 and 2 in order to file the assessments with the county by the September deadline.

There were no objections from Council to consider a motion at tonight's Regular Meeting to waive the second and third readings of Legislative Items 1 and 2 and proceed with adoption at tonight's Regular Meeting.

- 2) **EMERGENCY ORDINANCE: FIRST READING.** AN ORDINANCE LEVYING SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS FOR THE PURPOSE OF PROVIDING CERTAIN MAINTENANCE IN THE HEATHERWOODE SUBDIVISION IN THE CITY AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

ITEM 4. CITY MANAGER. – Issues/Reports.

Mr. Pozzuto reported on the following items:

“Concerts in the Park” Recap: The summer concert series went very well this year with a total attendance of more than 22,000. A video screen was used for the last two concerts to enable people in the back area of the park to see what was happening on stage. The video screen will also be used for the High School District Golf Championships that will be held at Heatherwoode Golf Course. There was an overwhelming response to the video screen from the audience at the concerts. Several businesses sponsored the video board including Miami Valley Hospital, Point Broadband and Warped Wing at no cost to the City. There may be a future request to purchase a video screen, but staff will be reaching out to sponsors in advance to see if they would be willing to sponsor it over a longer time period in order to pay for the purchase of the video screen. The video board could be utilized for a variety of community events such as a sporting event at the schools, movie night at Wright Station, etc.

Annual Street Resurfacing Program: The City’s annual street resurfacing program begins in September. This year’s program includes 24 streets compared to 15-16 in past years. The CIP budget for street resurfacing was increased from approximately \$900,000 to \$1.5 million to further the City’s investment in roadway infrastructure. The \$5.00 motor vehicle license tax that was approved earlier this year helps to fund the resurfacing of additional streets.

Springboro Community Theatre presents Theatre Under the Stars: The Springboro Community Theatre group will present outdoor theater performances at North Park, August 5-7 and August 12-14 with a production of “Oliver!” This is an annual program and all performances are free to the public.

State Grant for Demolition: The City received a \$10,000 grant from Warren County who facilitates the receipt of state grants. The state has a demolition program and the City received the grant funds to demolish the old barn at Clearcreek Park next to the maintenance building. The barn is too dilapidated to save and will be demolished using this funding.

Calendar Updates: Springboro Community Theatre presents “Oliver!” August 5-7 & August 12-14 at 7:30 pm at North Park Amphitheater. All performances are free; no tickets required. The next City Council Work Session will be held on Thursday, August 18, 2022 beginning at 6:00 PM followed by the Regular Meeting at 7:00 PM in Council Chambers. In addition, a Public Hearing will be held on Thursday, August 18, 2022 at 7:00 PM in Council Chambers to extend the City’s existing DORA (Designated Outdoor Refreshment Area) to the Historic Downtown area.

ITEM 1. CALL TO ORDER. Mayor Agenbroad called the Springboro, Ohio City Council Regular Meeting of Thursday, August 4, 2022 to order at 7:00 PM in Council Chambers at the Springboro Municipal Building, 320 W. Central Avenue, Springboro, Ohio.

ITEM 6. LEGISLATION: City Council held a Work Session at 6:00 PM tonight for approximately 10 minutes to discuss the following legislative items as well as other City business. During the Work Session, City Council entered Executive Session for approximately 45 minutes to discuss pending litigation in conference with the City Law Director; whereby, no votes were taken.

- 1) **ORDINANCE O-22-18: FIRST READING.** AN ORDINANCE DETERMINING TO PROCEED WITH UNDERTAKING IMPROVEMENTS AND PROVIDING MAINTENANCE TO CERTAIN PROPERTY IN THE CITY OF SPRINGBORO, COUNTY OF WARREN, OHIO, AS DESCRIBED IN ORDINANCE NO. O-22-17 AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY. (HEATHERWOODE SUBDIVISION), was read by the Clerk of Council.

This is the first reading of an ordinance determining to proceed with providing common area maintenance in the Heatherwoode Subdivision. The cost of the improvements will be paid by special assessments of \$625 per household/per year for a five-year period.

Mr. Hudson commented on Legislative Items 1 and 2 as follows:

Legislative Items 1 and 2 are steps two and three following the legislation approved at the last Council Meeting declaring the necessity for the improvements. These two legislative items authorize the City to proceed with levying special assessments to pay for the improvements at the request of the Heatherwoode Subdivision HOA. Upon approval of this legislation, the City will file the special assessments with Warren County, which will be levied on each property owner's tax bill in the amount of \$625 per year for a 5-year period (tax collection years 2023-2027). The county will collect this assessment on the designated properties and the City will remit the total amount collected directly to the Heatherwoode HOA for the furtherance of their HOA collections. Following approval of the initial ordinance declaring the necessity to collect the special assessments for these improvements, letters were sent to every property owner notifying them of the assessment. Property owners were directed to contact their HOA representative with any questions or comments; the City has not received any calls or questions concerning this notification. To reiterate, Legislative Item 1 acknowledges the intent to proceed with the improvements by levying special assessments following the notification process. Legislative Item 2 authorizes the City to levy the assessments at the request of the Heatherwoode HOA for the next five years.

Mayor Agenbroad presented the item for questions/comments of Council.

Mr. Brunner asked how long this special assessment process has been in effect.

Mr. Hudson replied that he believes this is the third cycle for this five-year assessment.

Ms. Iverson commented that this assessment has been in place at least eight years based on her history as a resident of the Heatherwoode Subdivision.

Mr. Hudson clarified that these special assessments are specifically for common area maintenance, lighting, etc.

As discussed at the Work Session, Mayor Agenbroad called for a motion to suspend the rules and waive the second and third readings of Legislative Items 1 and 2, Emergency Ordinances.

Mr. Chmiel motioned. Ms. Iverson seconded the motion.

- 3) **RESOLUTION R-22-26:** A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE CITY MANAGER TO EXECUTE THE ODOT PRELIMINARY LEGISLATION AS PRESENTED FOR THE COMPLETION AND APPOINTMENT AS THE LPA – LOCAL PUBLIC AGENCY FOR THE EDGEBROOKE DRIVE AND SR 73 INTERSECTION IMPROVEMENTS; WAR-SR-5.64, PID NO. 115005, was read by the Clerk of Council. Mr. Pozzuto's comments are summarized as follows:

This resolution authorizes ODOT preliminary legislation for the Edgebrook Drive and SR73 Intersection Improvements Project. The project includes a new traffic signal, crosswalks, and sidewalks. It is scheduled to be sold in 2024 by ODOT and constructed in 2025. The City's cost for this project is estimated to be \$181,171 of the total estimated cost of \$452,928, with the balance of the cost paid by federal funds.

Mayor Agenbroad presented the item for questions/comments of Council. No questions/comments.

Mayor Agenbroad called for a motion to adopt Resolution R-22-26.

City Manager's Report – Mr. Pozzuto reported on the following items:

“Concerts in the Park” Recap: The summer concert series is complete. The concerts were a success with more than 22,000 people in attendance overall. Mr. Pozzuto thanked the Park Board for the wonderful job they do each year coordinating the concert series. Mr. Pozzuto also thanked the Police Department and Public Works Department as well as staff members Sharon Rottert and Maureen Russell-Hodgson, who always make sure everything runs smoothly for each concert.

Annual Street Resurfacing Program: The City’s annual street resurfacing program will begin sometime in September. In past years, the City has averaged approximately 15-16 streets to be resurfaced; however, with Council’s increased investment in the City’s street program, the City is now able to resurface 24 streets this year and will be doing that for the foreseeable future. The street budget has increased from approximately \$900,000 to approximately \$1.5M annually in the City’s Capital Improvement Program. The City will be focusing more on its core competencies, one of which is to keep the City’s streets maintained. Again, the City will be adding more streets to the annual repaving program in future years to augment that maintenance program.

Committee Reports –

Mr. Chmiel – Park Board – The Park Board met on Wednesday, August 3 to discuss the following items: Work has begun on the rain garden at Clearcreek Park, which is expected to be completed sometime in December. The splash pad at Kacie Jane Park continues to be extremely popular, and will remain open through Labor Day and possibly longer, weather dependent.

ITEM 8. OTHER BUSINESS. Mayor Agenbroad presented a notice of an application for a Liquor Permit as follows:

The City of Springboro is in receipt of a notification for a request for a liquor permit transfer bearing the number 8320965 from Bear Creek Holdings Co. dba Donut Haus Bakery, 305 W. Central Avenue, Springboro, Ohio 45066 to Smokehouse Property LLC, 155 W. Central Avenue, Springboro, Ohio 45066. The request is for Permits D-5 and D-6 – Nightclub Permit. Spirituous liquor for on-premises consumption beer, wine and mixed beverages for on-premises consumption or carry out until 2:30 a.m. On premises consumption of spirituous liquor, beer, wine, mixed beverages until 2:30 PM with Sunday sales.

The Springboro Police Division has completed a records check on the applicant/application and based on its investigation makes the following recommendation:

The Springboro Police Department can find no cause for objection to this application and recommends Council and the City of Springboro not express any objections and not request a hearing from the Ohio Division of Liquor Control concerning this application.

Mayor Agenbroad presented the item for questions/comments of Council. No questions/comments.

Mayor Agenbroad called for a motion that the City Council and the City of Springboro not express any objections and not request a hearing from the Ohio Division of Liquor Control regarding this Liquor Permit application.

- ITEM 9. FINAL COUNCIL AND MANAGER COMMENTS.** In reference to the summer concerts, Mr. Harding thanked the Park Board and City Staff. The Wee Panthers Football organization's fundraiser netted \$17,000 this year. The organization has been volunteering to provide beer sales since 2014 and has raised \$75,000 total. This year, Wee Panthers Football has 414 players, and this fundraiser goes a long way to support the organization.

Mayor Agenbroad commented that the Wee Panthers organization works hard as unpaid volunteers to manage the beverage sales at the concerts, and it is a great fundraiser for the Wee Panthers program. Mayor Agenbroad further commented that City staff works very hard on the "Concerts in the Park" program and everyone really enjoys the concerts. It was a great concert season that included a new video screen for the audience to enjoy, and the Park Board did a great job with the concert line-up.

At this time, Mayor Agenbroad stated that City Council would enter Executive Session under ORC121.22(G), following the Regular Order of Business, to discuss pending litigation in conference with the City Law Director and to consider the compensation of a public employee; whereby, no votes will be taken.

As a reminder to the public, no votes are taken during Executive Session.

- ITEM 10. GUEST COMMENTS.** Mayor Agenbroad invited any guests that wished to be heard to approach the podium, state their name and address for the record, and make their comments accordingly.

Guest Comments are summarized as follows:

1) Leena Rekhi-Salmon, 8066 Country Brook Court, Clearcreek Township – Ms. Rekhi- Salmon commented that last Thursday, July 28 at approximately 4:45 PM someone anonymously contacted the Police Department to make a request for service regarding someone parked in the handicap parking space who is not handicapped (at her business-The Goddard School in Springboro), and that person was her husband, Craig (Salmon-Gilmore), who was parked temporarily. The caller refused to provide their identity or any other information. Two police officers in police cruisers arrived and explained that they were there to respond to a call concerning illegal parking in a handicap parking space. She explained to the officers that she and her husband were the property/business owners and the car was attended to the entire time. The officers then left, and the officers' conduct was perfect with no

criticisms or complaints. She requested a print out of the request for service and the police department representative told her that she would be shocked to know how many calls the department receives. Mr. Rekhi-Salmon continued her comments by questioning how many frivolous calls like this are made to the police department and commenting that it is an incredible waste of time and resources; one officer's time is bad enough, but in this instance two officers responded. Since the caller did not have to report their name, there is no path for accountability. Thankfully no one was hurt, but what if someone was for a call that was actually fake. This call did induce panic. As business owners, she and her sister were shocked to see two police cruisers in front of their school at the height of afternoon pick-up, and several parents were scared, afraid, terrified to see the police at their child's preschool fearing the worst. They were all scared for what; this was an incredible waste. She knows that callers do not have to state their name or provide any other information, but she thinks it is such a waste when something better could be done with the officers' time. Ms. Rekhi-Salmon concluded her comments by thanking Council for their time.

Mayor Agenbroad thanked Ms. Rekhi-Salmon for her comments, which are duly noted for the record.

Mayor Agenbroad invited any other guests that wished to be heard to approach the podium, state their name and address for the record, and make their comments accordingly.

2) Craig Salmon-Gilmore, 8066 Country Brook, Court Clearcreek Township – Mr. Salmon-Gilmore thanked friends and families for their kind words of support, and who support them on a regular basis. Also, the support, love and encouragement for his wife Leena (Rekhi-Salmon) and their family, and for all who have these experiences. Mr. Salmon-Gilmore commented that many know first-hand because the work toward building more diverse and inclusive communities depends largely on the zip code, and the work can be challenging. Mr. Salmon-Gilmore explained that he was surprised and found the experience unsettling as he was standing eight feet from his car in the process of delivering food to family members. The officers arrived and were stellar in their behavior; there is not a criticism that either he or his wife has against the Springboro Police Department. The challenge that he has and the quandary that he is in is to be in this position, especially in light of what he and Leena (Rekhi-Salmon) are doing in the community to build diversity and inclusion, to have this tough conversation. It is shocking to him because he could not figure out why someone would call the police to anonymously report this situation. When the officers approached him and shared the Ohio Revised Code informing him that they have the right to be on public or private property when responding to a complaint about illegally parking in a handicap space, he understood, but the optics on that were pretty crappy. Mr. Salmon-Gilmore further explained that some of the children at the preschool were visibly upset, the parents were visibly upset and concerned, and one of the children thought he had been arrested. Mr. Salmon-Gilmore further commented that we are indirectly training our children to be afraid, our black and brown children to be afraid, and that is not what we want. We want the officers and the children and all of our families to respect, honor and befriend the police in our community. When someone makes a frivolous call such as the call that was made on him, it is his hope that they have to state their name because right now that person is a ghost. Mr. Salmon-Gilmore added that they know who it is or they believe they do, and it is unfortunate for this person because they have no consequence for their behavior, but he does, because he had to walk away from the police officers after having a conversation and identifying himself as one of the property/business owners because he was emotional. Imagine if someone was not emotionally and spiritually centered such as he is, and is of his same stature, it could have turned out a totally different way. Mr. Salmon-Gilmore continued by commenting that he wanted to bring to light that we still have a lot of work to do in our community. It is not with the Police Department; it is with members of our community. He encouraged City Council and staff and all of those in our government to really embrace the challenge before us of diversity and inclusion and that we are all one, as he continues to say. Mr. Salmon-Gilmore thanked City Council for allowing him to share this summary of his comments and for their time. He hopes we are able to move forward and that we will move forward. Mr. Salmon-Gilmore finally added that when people think of Springboro

they are thinking of Springboro in a more positive light; diversity and inclusion are here and we want to continue to embrace that. He thanked Council for their time, encouragement and everything they are doing for the community.

Mayor Agenbroad thanked Mr. Salmon-Gilmore for his comments, which are duly noted for the record.

Mayor Agenbroad invited any other guests that wished to be heard to approach the podium, state their name and address for the record, and make their comments accordingly.

No other guests came forward.

At this time, Mayor Agenbroad thanked the MVCC for tonight's telecast and scheduled rebroadcasts of this Springboro City Council Meeting.

Mayor Agenbroad called for a motion to conclude the televised portion of the meeting at approximately 7:20 PM and to enter Executive Session to discuss pending litigation in conference with the City Law Director and to consider the compensation of a public employee; whereby, no votes will be taken.


