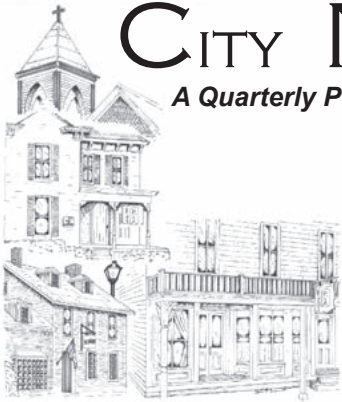

Greetings from the Mayor and City Council

A Citizen Attitude and Public Opinion Survey was conducted by the Miami University Center for Public Management and Regional Affairs in March of this year. Senior Project Manager Dr. Mark Morris presented the results of the survey in a final report to City Council on July 21. Council was pleased to hear that the survey resulted in a 90% satisfaction rate, which is equivalent to nine out of ten residents surveyed were either satisfied or very satisfied living in Springboro! The response rate was very good, and we truly appreciate the residents who participated in the survey. Springboro's first citizen survey was conducted in 2008, which established a benchmark for the City. The survey will be repeated every three to four years to allow the City to track its performance based on public opinion.

The deadline to register for the upcoming election is October 11. Also, please notify the Board of Elections if you have a change of address as soon as possible prior to the election; your current address must be listed at your designated polling site. Polls open at 6:30 AM and close at 7:30 PM on Election Day.

As the end of the year approaches, City Council will be reviewing the City's Five-Year Capital Improvement Plan and starting the budget process for 2012. Council will be assessing capital needs for the next five years such as street and park improvements, water and sewer infrastructure improvements, and equipment. Council will also work with staff to budget for the costs of operating the City on a daily basis in the upcoming year. Budgetary decisions are always tough, but we take this responsibility very seriously. Part of that responsibility is to answer to the needs of the community through our city programs and services, and first and foremost, to continue providing the high level of service our residents expect. As always, our aim is to accomplish this objective in the most cost effective manner possible for our community. The 5-Year Capital Improvement Plan will be presented in October and the 2012 Budget will be presented in November.

Every year we truly look forward to kicking-off the holiday season with the community at The Christmas in Historic Springboro Festival, held the weekend before Thanksgiving on November 18th, 19th, and 20th. This year's theme is "Santa's Silver Celebration" marking the 25th year of the festival. The festival officially begins with a tree-lighting ceremony on Friday evening, continues with Santa's Parade at Noon on Saturday, and concludes around 5:00 p.m. on Sunday. City Council looks forward to seeing everyone on S. Main Street during the parade and gathering downtown to enjoy this great tradition. Springboro And Carlisle Join Forces

Collaboration is a big buzzword these days in the area of local government and Springboro always attempts to do collaborative projects to save tax payer dollars or increase revenues when opportunities present themselves.

A few months ago, the City approached the City of Carlisle concerning their need for building inspection services. After a few meetings, it was quickly realized that the City of Springboro and the City of Carlisle could work together on building inspections services – increasing services in both communities while saving money.

Springboro building inspectors will conduct all inspections in Carlisle, while charging Carlisle a fee for the services. This arrangement will allow Springboro to collect additional building revenue, while allowing Carlisle to pay a reduced fee for building services.

Water & Sewer Bill Assistance Program

On May 5, 2011, the City Council passed the Water & Sewer Assistance Program. Eligibility for the program is based on three criteria:

- Applicants must be residents of the City;
- The utility bill must be in the applicant's name;
- Income cannot exceed 175% of the federal poverty guidelines under the Department of Health and Human Services.

Citizen Attitude and Public Opinion Survey Results

In March, the City, in conjunction with Miami University, conducted a Citizen Attitude and Public Opinion Survey to gauge the level of satisfaction our residents have with city services. This survey helped to show what citizens think we do well, don't do well and what needs to be improved upon. This was a follow up to the first survey conducted in 2008.

Thank you to the 518 of 1,197 households that responded to the random survey. That comprises a response rate of 43%, which is an excellent response to a survey of this type. In 2011, 90% of respondents said they were either "very satisfied" or "satisfied" with living in Springboro!

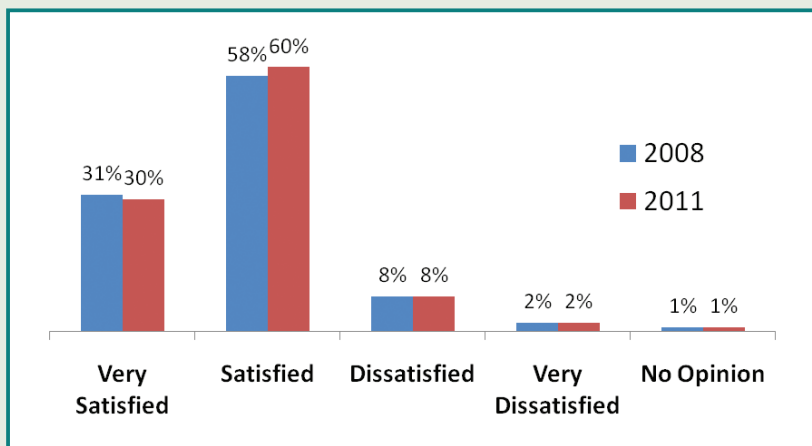
Other results and things that the City does well:

- New Recycling Program instituted in 2010. 87% said they were satisfied with the program.
- 75% were either satisfied or very satisfied with Police services.
- Satisfaction with zoning enforcement and park conditions improved from 2008.
- 80% of respondents stated they get most of their information about the City and City activities from the publication you are reading right now – the *City Notes Newsletter*!

Things that need to be improved:

- Pothole Repair – 16% of respondents stated it has gotten worse since 2008.
- Snow & Ice Removal – 12% of respondents stated it has declined since 2008.
- Property Maintenance control concerning overgrown weeds.

Overall, the City scored well in most categories, but as always, there is room for improvement with everything we do. City Staff continually analyzes all processes in the City to ensure we are providing the best services possible. Thank you again to everyone who participated in the survey.

Parks Update

Many projects have been occurring at your Springboro Parks over the past few months!

For you baseball enthusiasts, you will be happy to know that a brand new baseball diamond has been constructed on the western side of Clearcreek Park. This is one of our larger diamonds that has been constructed. It is 325 feet to dead center field, 300 feet to the left field pole and 290 feet to the right field pole – with our own little version of the “green monster”. This brings our total number of ball diamonds to 10 within the City.

Also in that area, construction should be completed soon on the new parking lot and entrance/exit to Lower Springboro Road. This parking area will add an additional 100 parking spaces to the western portion of the park, as well as a new way to access the park.

As we have reported in previous editions of the *City Notes Newsletter*, our park solar project, which is now completed and is generating about 3 Megawatts of power every month through the 124 panels!!, also allows the City to provide free public Wi-Fi in and around the solar panels. So, please feel free to bring your laptop down to the park to surf the net!



Police Beat

We would like to extend our congratulations to Julie Kessler of Springboro, who has recently been named as Ohio's newest appointee to the DARE AMERICA Youth Advisory Board (YAB).

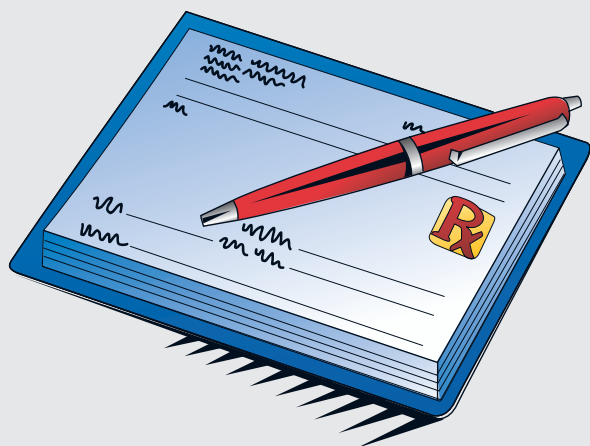
Julie was picked amongst several candidates by the DARE Association of Ohio Board of Directors to represent Ohio through July of 2013. Julie is currently a Sophomore at Springboro High School. At the completion of her service on the YAB, Julie will be eligible to compete for a \$20,000 DARE America scholarship that is awarded to one lucky senior each year who has fulfilled his/her service on the YAB.

The YAB was initiated by DARE America in 2000 and is composed of 50 members - one represented from each state in the U.S. Students are selected through a state wide search by each state board. The YAB gives DARE graduates an opportunity to speak to issues impacting national and worldwide DARE programs and to advise DARE America and local DARE programs, government, and community leaders on drug and violence prevention strategies beneficial to youth.

Sgt. Don Wilson, Springboro School Resource Officer (SRO) and current VP of the DARE Association of Ohio states, “Julie will be a great asset to DARE, an excellent role model and she will represent Springboro with pride. Please join me in wishing her well in her newest responsibility and stand beside her in drug use and violence prevention.”

Officer Randy Peagler attended the (NCCJ) National Conference for Community and Justice Police and Youth Camp 2011 in June. The camp was held at Camp Fire USA in Huber Heights. Twenty-five (25) kids ages 10-12 from Dayton, Brookville, Huber Heights, Trotwood, Lebanon and Springboro attended the Camp. The camp is structured to teach youth about dealing with peer-pressure, Internet Safety, leadership issues and good decision making. They also had a visit from the Dayton Police-SWAT Team and Huber Heights K-9 unit.





Prescription Discount Drug Card Program

Potentially Save On Prescriptions With Our New Prescription Discount Card!

The City of Springboro has a new program to offer savings on prescription drugs to residents who are without health insurance, a traditional benefits plan, or have prescriptions that are not covered by insurance. The Prescription Discount Card is made available to residents by the City of Springboro in collaboration with the National League of Cities (NLC) and is made possible through Springboro's membership in NLC.

The card is **FREE to all Springboro residents**, regardless of age, income or existing health insurance. By using this card you may **save an average of 20%** off the regular retail price of prescription drugs at participating pharmacies.

This is not insurance. Discounts are only available at participating pharmacies. By using this card, participants agree to pay the entire prescription cost less any applicable discount. Savings may vary by drug and pharmacy.



Leaf Collection

The City started the Leaf Collection program in 2010 and we felt it was a great success! Hopefully citizens were able to utilize the program to their benefit. Details of the 2011 Leaf Collection Program are below:

Collection Schedule – Leaves will be collected from Monday, October 10 - Friday, December 16.

Areas To Be Collected – Leaves will be collected from all areas of the City. Crews will collect leaves from each area a minimum of **THREE TIMES** after the start of collection. (Please see map on opposite page to determine the dates your street/area will be visited during the collection program.) If your leaves don't happen to be falling in October when crews visit the first time – don't worry, crews will be back a minimum of two more times well into December.

What We Need You To Do To Help – To keep the leaf collection on schedule and to help keep costs down, please adhere to the following:

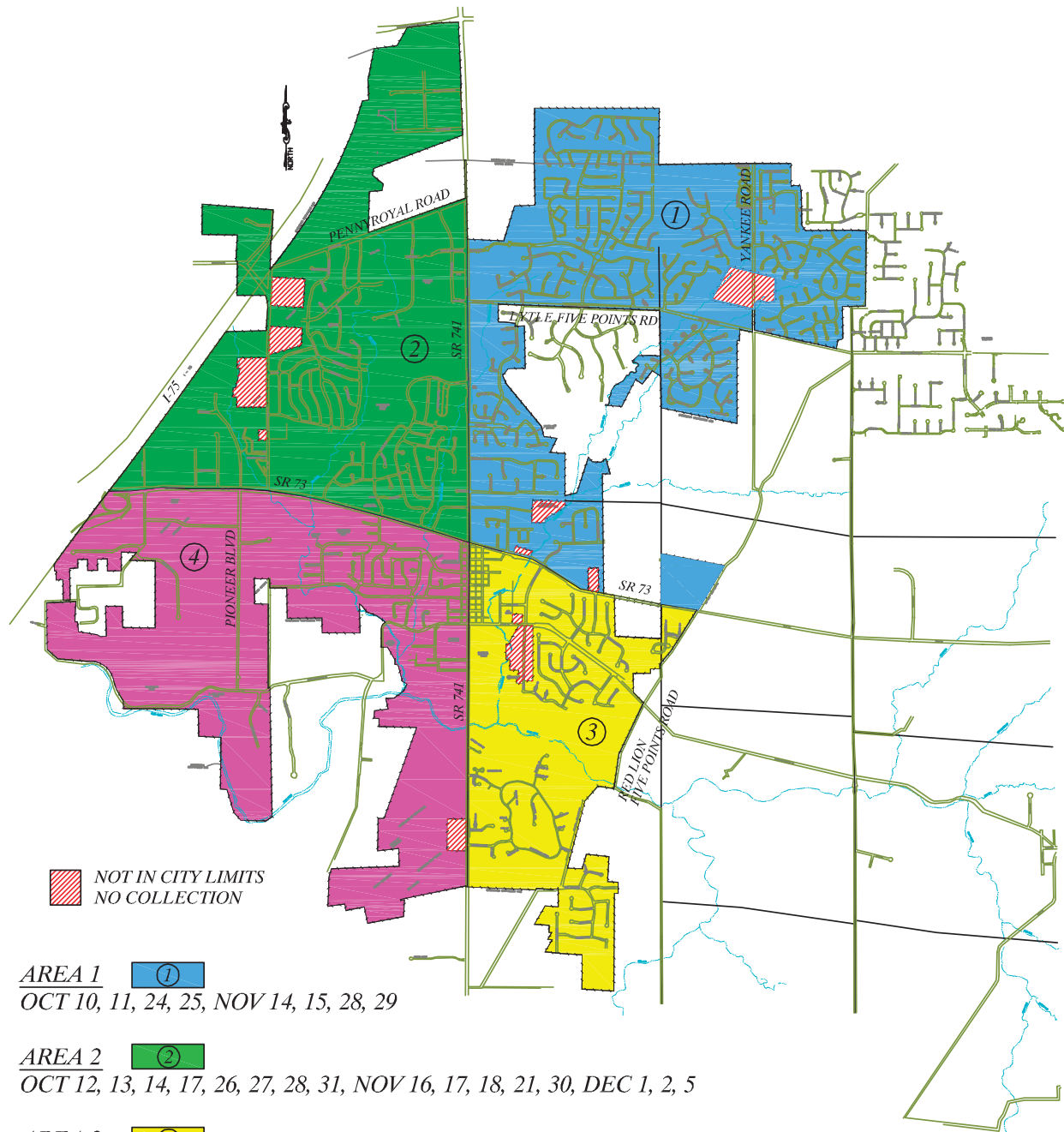
- **DO NOT rake anything except leaves out to the curb for collection.** Branches, sticks and other waste clogs the machinery and can potentially damage the leaf vacuum.
- Rake your leaves to the curb or tree lawn, but not into the street where they will block traffic.
- Please have your leaves raked out to the curb at least two (2) days before crews are scheduled to arrive (Again, see leaf collection map.) Depending on Mother Nature, equipment problems and the volume of leaves, the crews may be as much as two days early or two days late.
- Do not bag your leaves and leave them out for the City's collection crews. Any bagged leaves will be by-passed. Leaves must be raked out to the tree lawn or curb all by themselves for ease of pick up by the leaf vacuums. Please rake leaves to as close to the curb as possible. Bagged leaves will be left for Waste Management to pick up as part of their yard waste collection.
- **Do not park vehicles near the leaf piles.** Leaves must be accessible to the trucks and the leaf vacuum. If leaves are not accessible, **they will be bypassed** – we do not want to risk damaging the leaf vacuum or your vehicles.

Vendors will also be there to provide food and beverages at minimal cost.

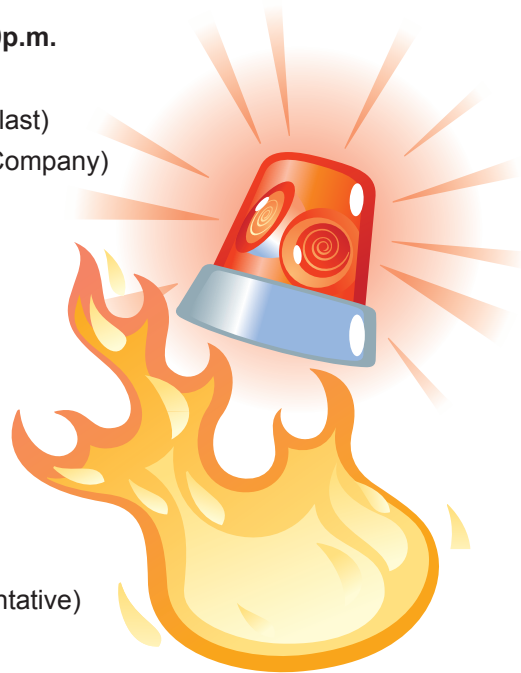

New Property Maintenance Contact Number

The City of Springboro is utilizing a new company to conduct property maintenance inspections within the City. SouthWest Ohio Building Inspections (SWOBI) is the new contact in case you would like to call in a complaint in your neighborhood (or elsewhere) about high weeds, broken gutters or downspouts on houses, etc.

**Please keep in mind - sometimes complaints cannot be dealt with immediately. There is a certain notification process that must be legally followed to allow the property owner the opportunity to rectify the situation before the City can officially take action to abate the problem.*

Permits for Building or Remodeling

Any resident wishing to remodel, build or add-on to any structure must first obtain a permit from the City of Springboro Building/Zoning Department. This would include the construction of decks, fences, patio covers, enclosures, accessory buildings, installation of irrigation systems, etc. Any remodeling to existing houses such as basements or any unfinished area in a home requires building plans to be filed with the City along with a building application. Applications may be obtained at 320 West Central Avenue or downloaded from the City of Springboro Web Page (www.ci.springboro.oh.us).

Double fees are charged for work completed without a permit and some work may need to be removed and redone. It is very important to apply for the appropriate permit prior to work being started. Problems have developed when residents put their house on the market without proper inspection records on file with the Building Department.

Stormwater Runoff

Illicit Discharges

An illicit discharge is defined by the US EPA's Phase II Storm Water Regulations as "any discharge to an MS4 (Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System) that is not composed entirely of storm water..." with some exceptions. These exceptions include discharges from NPDES permitted industrial sources and discharges from fire-fighting activities. Illicit discharges are considered "illicit" because MS4s are not designed to accept, process, or discharge such non-storm water wastes.

In most communities, the MS4 is directly connected to a water body and does not receive any type of treatment prior to its discharge to receiving water bodies of the United States. Because of this non-treatment, it is vital that only storm water be discharged from these MS4s. The general permit received by Phase II regulated communities requires that those communities develop an illicit discharge detection and elimination (IDDE) program. This program will assist communities in meeting their requirement set forth in their general NPDES permit.

As part of the IDDE program the City has inspected 110 storm sewer outfalls located in the northwest quadrant of the city to determine if there are any illicit discharges.

Fall Stormwater Alerts – Stormwater Management Tips

Did you know? Yard debris, including leaves and other organic plant materials like shrubbery trimmings and grass clippings, are a significant source of stormwater pollution...plus they can clog the storm drains!

Debris can carry fertilizers and pesticides from your yard and deposit them in our streams and rivers.

Here are some ways you can help on your property:

- Don't use your hose as a broom. Sweep up yard debris rather than washing it down the driveway or street. Compost or recycle your yard waste.
- Fertilize now rather than springtime. Fall fertilizations promote vigorous root growth and prevents fertilizers from leaching into our streams.
- Do a soil test and consider phosphorus-free fertilizers. Contact your OSU County Extension Service office for more information.
- Choose fertilizers with "slow release" forms of nitrogen which are less likely to leach untreated from your yard through the storm drains into rivers, creeks, and streams. Read and follow manufacturer's instructions. More is not better!

PUBLIC WORKS PROJECTS



East Central Avenue, SR 73, Roadway Widening

The "East Central Avenue, SR 73, Roadway Widening" project, which consisted of widening East Central Avenue from approximately 250 feet east of South Richards Run to 550 feet east of Farmridge Road has been completed by Barrett Paving Materials Inc.

Gilpin Drive – South Street Improvements

South Street from the alley west of South Main Street to Gilpin Drive will be widened to include the installation of curb and gutter, storm sewers and a 5 foot concrete sidewalk on the south side of South Street.

The remainder of Gilpin Drive will also be widened with the installation of curb and gutter on the east side of Gilpin Drive.

The missing sidewalk and curb and gutter on the west side of the street will be completed. A storm sewer system will also be installed. WG Stang was awarded the contract and started work on August 22.



South Main Street Sidewalk Improvements Phase III

The City is completing plans to finalize the construction of the sidewalk on South Main Street. The final sections of sidewalk, along the east side of South Main Street, from Heatherwoode Boulevard to Edinburgh Drive will be completed later this year, which will allow pedestrian traffic from downtown Springboro to the High School.

West Tech Road Extension Phase 1

West Tech Road will be extended approximately 1300 feet from its west terminus to open up the land in the South Tech Development. Sanitary sewers and water mains will be extended from existing Montgomery County facilities to serve this project. The construction includes the installation of curb and gutter, storm sewers and a 6 foot wide concrete sidewalk. Construction of Phase I should be completed later this year.

2011 Street Resurfacing Program

Barrett Paving Materials has been awarded the 2011 Street Resurfacing Program. The contractor has started to replace

the deteriorated or damaged curb, sidewalk and driveway aprons in preparation for the resurfacing. The asphalt streets will be milled and overlaid with asphalt. The streets in this year's program include: Angel Court, Brookside Drive, Carnoustie Lane, Northbrook Court, Deer Trail Drive (from Pennyroyal Road to Paddock Trail), Elkins Drive (west end), Greenleaf Village Drive (west end, from Country Club Lane to Abbey Springs), Reed Road (west end), Renwood Place (through North Park), Royal Birkdale Drive (east of the eye brow), Sharts Road, Springmill Drive (from Yankee Road to Millbrook Court, including 100 feet of Reed Road), Dalfaber Lane, Perth Court and Inverness Court.

North Main Street Concrete Improvements

Double Jay Construction, Inc. was awarded the North Main Street Concrete Improvement project. The contractor will replace damaged and deteriorated curb, sidewalk and driveway aprons. This work is being completed in preparation for the State of Ohio North Main Street (SR 741) Resurfacing Project in 2012. North Main Street (SR 741) will be resurfaced from Central Avenue (SR 73) to the north corporation limit.



Settlers Walk Sidewalk Installation

Brad Evans Excavating has been awarded the Settlers Walk Sidewalk Installation Project. The contractor will install concrete sidewalk on undeveloped lots in the Settlers Walk Subdivision. The project is being completed to improve pedestrian mobility within the Subdivision. All areas will be completed with the exception of the Cove and Stonebridge.
