

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Springboro's Urban Forest

Ash Trees

2006 marked the year that Springboro confirmed the presence of the Emerald Ash Borer within the city limits, which put the EAB Management plan into action. Over the past 8 years, the Parks Department identified infested trees in the right-of-ways, parks and other public properties throughout the city and removals of the most hazardous trees in these areas began right away.

To date we have removed an estimated 400 Ash trees, and replaced around 90%. We have replaced these removals with multiple different varieties of trees to try and diversify the urban forest and avoid this type of destruction in the future.

Cherry Trees Planted at Gardner Park

As part of a cooperative venture called **Operation 1000 Cherry Trees**, between the Dayton area and Japan, the City has planted 10 Yoshino Cherry Trees at Gardner Park. Operation 1000 Cherry Trees is an organization dedicated to raising funds to purchase and plant cherry trees in and around Dayton, Ohio. It gives Japanese and Japanese-American people the opportunity to show their appreciation, while at the same time, planting a seed for friendship that will endure for generations.

Operation 1000 Cherry Trees was conceived by Alex Hara, who is a Japanese-born businessman living in

From the Office of Mayor and City Council

We have some great summer highlights to share with everyone not the least of which is our new northbound entrance ramp to I-75 on State Route 73, which officially opened to traffic on August 27, a month ahead of schedule!

We received an overwhelming amount of complimentary remarks concerning this project. Many of our residents and businesses expressed their support of the new ramp and we thank the community for your patience during the temporary closures and traffic conditions while the ramp was under construction. Special thanks are owed to the Warren County Transportation Improvement District (TID) for managing the project in cooperation with ODOT and Springboro. Nearly 80% of the project was paid for by federal transportation dollars granted through the Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission and we also thank them for their consideration along with our City Manager Chris Thompson whose determined efforts and collaboration with the TID made this project a reality. Our next major enterprise with the Warren County TID will be the SR741/SR73 intersection improvements project, which is already in the preliminary planning stages and queued to receive \$3MM in federal funding under the Mitigation and Air Quality Improvement (CMAQ) Program in 2017-18. We are very much looking forward to working together again to improve traffic flow and safety at our City's main intersection.

Our parks were extremely busy this summer, especially at North Park, which is the venue for our annual **"Concerts in the Park"** series. We had one of our best concert seasons yet with record attendance for the eight performances. Our new Friday night concert schedule was also well received and we truly appreciated the great feedback from residents in support of the Friday concert offerings. We are already anticipating next year's series to be another great line-up and the Friday concerts to be a summer highlight for the community. Many thanks to the residents who serve on the Park Board and our staff for making each year a success; it wouldn't be possible without you!

We were also very excited to see so many people participating in **"The Big Event"** on Labor Day weekend, which featured the 'Boro Bogey Run at

Heatherwoode Golf Course. About 90 runners/walkers enjoyed our beautiful golf course over approximately five miles of cart path. Also, around 120 people participated in the Bike the 'Boro 3, 10 and 16-mile bike races followed by a community festival at North Park on August 30. An incredible amount of time and effort went into coordinating this event thanks to our creative and dedicated staff and the many volunteers who made our first "Big Event" a big success!

Finally, Playhouse South presented its sixth season of **Theater Under the Stars** at the North Park Amphitheater with "Honk!", a musical adaptation of *The Ugly Duckling*, and entertained more than 1,800 audience members over two weekends in August. Playhouse South plans to be back next year with another great production!

We are approaching the end of another year and continue to enjoy business growth in Springboro. So far this year, city officials were invited to attend ribbon cuttings and grand openings for eight new businesses and for several celebrating five, ten and fifteen years of operating in Springboro. Our businesses are vital to our city's economy and we will continue to support local commerce in every way possible.

In addition, our Planning Commission continues to review plans for residential and commercial development projects in the city at South Tech Business Park and along W. Central Avenue and N. Main Street, which will be exciting to watch take shape in the coming year. We look forward to welcoming these businesses to our community as well when development is complete. Our Planning Commission has a very dedicated service history and has done an excellent job of planning and managing our city's growth and development. Our comprehensive approach to community development using tools such our Land Use Master Plan and Planned Unit Development ordinance has served us well in furthering Springboro's overall beauty and quality of life, and proper planning has promoted our viability as a community and helped to secure our future economic success. Leaf Collection

It's hard to believe, but it is that time of year again when the leaves will be falling off the trees! Details of the 2014 Leaf Collection Program are below:

Collection Schedule – Leaves will be collected from Monday, October 6 through Friday, December 12.

Areas To Be Collected – Leaves will be collected from all areas of the City. Crews will collect leaves from each area a minimum of FOUR TIMES after the start of collection. (*Please see map on opposite page to determine dates your street/area will be visited during the collection program.*) If your leaves don't happen to be falling in October when crews visit the first time – don't worry, crews will be back a minimum of three more times well into December.

What We Need You To Do To Help – To keep the leaf collection on schedule and to help keep costs down, please adhere to the following:

- **DO NOT rake anything except leaves out to the curb for collection.** Branches, sticks and other waste clog the machinery and can potentially damage the leaf vacuum.
- Rake your leaves to the curb or tree lawn, but not into the street where they will block traffic.
- Please have your leaves raked out to the curb at least two (2) days before crews are scheduled to arrive

(Again, see *leaf collection map*.) Depending on Mother Nature, equipment problems and the volume of leaves, the crews may be as much as two days early or two days late.



- Do not bag your leaves and leave them out for the City's collection crews. Any bagged leaves will be bypassed. Leaves must be raked out to the tree lawn or curb all by themselves for ease of pick up by the leaf vacuums. Please rake leaves to as **close to the curb as possible**. Bagged leaves will be left for Waste Management to pick up as part of their yard waste collection.
- **Do not park vehicles within 20 feet of the leaf piles.** Leaves must be accessible to the trucks and the leaf vacuum. If leaves are not accessible, **they will be bypassed** – we do not want to risk damaging the leaf vacuum or your vehicles.




2014 LEAF COLLECTION SCHEDULE

Police Beat



PELC Graduate

Sergeant Eric Abrams graduated from the 65th class of the Police Executive Leadership College on May 16, 2014. The Vision of PELC is "to develop dynamic, visionary leaders to effectively serve and protect our communities" and their mission is "to provide unique and innovative leadership education geared toward today's demands and tomorrow's needs."

PELC involves over three weeks of classes put on by the Ohio Chief's of Police, Law Enforcement Foundation. Students are required to complete 24 required readings, 6 research papers, 3 speeches, and work on three team projects. Over 17 different instructors who are considered experts in their field comprise the cadre of instructors in the Leadership College.

Sgt. Abrams joined the Springboro Police Department in September of 2007 and was promoted to Sergeant in 2013.



Ohio D.A.R.E. Award

Chief Jeff Kruithoff was recently named the Ohio D.A.R.E. Law Enforcement Executive of the Year, as nominated by Sgt. Don Wilson.

The D.A.R.E. (Drug Abuse Resistance Education) program is an internationally recognized, model program created in 1983 by the Los Angeles Police Department and the Los Angeles Unified School District.

D.A.R.E. provides students from kindergarten through high school with the skills necessary to recognize and resist pressures to experiment with drugs and to avoid gangs and violence. Lessons emphasize self-esteem, decision making, interpersonal communications skills, the consequences of drug abuse, conflict resolution and positive alternatives to substance abuse.



National Prescription Drug Take Back Day

At our most recent National Prescription Drug Take Back Day, the Police Department collected 77.5 pounds of prescription drugs! Thank you to everyone who participated.

Prescription medications play an important role in the health of millions of Americans. However, expired medications or unused drugs often stay in the back of cabinets for months or even years. These expired drugs can pose significant health hazards to toddlers, teens and even family pets. Some medications are so potent that even one dose could be fatal if accidentally ingested.



Parks Update

Clearcreek Park

The second phase of the walking path that will eventually traverse the entire park was recently begun. Phase 2 will stretch from the western edge of the park north toward the new maintenance building.

North Park

The entrance to North Park was totally rebuilt, with the drive aisle widened to better accommodate two-way traffic and a sidewalk constructed to connect Tamarack Trail with the park entrance.

Hazel Woods Park

The City's newest park! The joint park project with the City of Franklin is well under way with the development of a master plan. Two members of each city's park board have been meeting over the past few months finalizing the plan. Preliminary plans include a dog park, more Soccer/LAX fields, shelters, a concession stand and playgrounds.

The design and permits for a bridge to access the park continues as we are working through the Army Core of Engineers and the EPA.

Springboro Ranked #8 Safest Place to Live In Ohio

The SafeWise Report released its "50 Safest Cities in Ohio" and Springboro is ranked #8 Safest Place to Live in Ohio. To compile this report, SafeWise used the most recent FBI crime data from 2011, population, and other ranking factors, like unique safety initiatives and security programs implemented within the past few years. From the hundreds of cities in Ohio, they narrowed the list down to 50 and assigned rankings according to how the city met the criteria.

Beggar's Night

The City of Springboro Beggar's Night will be observed on Friday, October 31st from 6:00 to 8:00 p.m. The City kindly reminds everyone to be extra cautious when driving to ensure that Beggar's Night is not only fun, but safe too!

There is an activity that happens in urban areas called an illicit discharge - an illegal discharge of pollution to a city's storm sewer system.

Illicit discharges primarily happen in two ways

- 1. Dumping pollutants down storm drains**
- 2. Connecting wastewater pipes to a storm sewer system**

The Right Hook up for Water Quality

Both of these activities pollute our water by carrying contaminants to the stream through the storm sewer system. Also, if your city has a combined storm sewer and sanitary sewer system, connecting your gutter downspouts to the storm sewer can result in overloading the system causing backups and overflows of sewage.

This kind of activity, whether intentional or unknown, is becoming a significant source of pollution and has a negative impact on our water quality and stream life. *It is a good practice to assume that all storm sewer drainage goes straight to the stream, not a treatment plant.*

PROBLEM



Problem- Hosing/blowing leaves, grass clippings, salt, fertilizer and other yard waste down the storm drain.

ALTERNATIVE



Alternative- Sweep up and compost large yard waste, dispose of safe chemicals in trash, and sweep or blow fertilizer and grass clippings back into yard.



Problem—Dumping cleaning supplies, oil, paint, fuel, batteries, trash, car fluids, pesticides or any other chemical down the storm drain.



Alternative- Take all unused chemical products to a waste management facility.

Washing your car on your lawn traps pollutants by filtering them through the soil and also waters your grass. Also, when draining swimming pool water, you can de-chlorinate the water or drain slowly into the grass.



Problem—Discharging liquids to the wrong sewer, such as sending used water from sinks, tubs, washers, floor drains and other household drains to the storm sewer; and also liquid from failing septic systems, broken sewer lines and sewage pipes that are connected to the storm sewer.



Alternative- Ensure that used water (gray water) is piped to the sanitary sewer to be treated.

Repair/replace failing septic systems, or connect up to city sanitary sewer system.

Disconnecting downspouts & draining run off into grass away from house, rain barrels or gardens decreases stream bank erosion.

In general, excess nutrients from yard waste and fertilizer decrease the oxygen in the water that is needed for life in the stream. Toxins, metals, oil and bacteria from the other activities poison the water making it unsafe for people and wildlife.

Road Salt Shortage and Helping Us With Snowplowing

Road Salt Shortage

You may have been reading in the newspaper or on-line recently about the road salt shortage and extremely high prices being experienced locally and in all of Ohio. In preparation for the upcoming winter, we wanted to inform you of where we stand right now and steps we have taken to minimize any impact to our residents.

Recently, the City has been able to secure 1,000 tons of salt from True Point and we have already taken delivery of 500 tons. (The City typically purchases anywhere between 1,000-3,000 tons of salt each winter. 300 tons of salt can usually get us through one 3-inch snow event.)

Unfortunately, while we are able to purchase some salt (when many communities can't), the price is almost double what we paid last year. In 2013 we paid \$55 per ton and this year we are paying \$109 per ton.

In the event that we have a severe winter and are not able to secure as much salt as we may need, we are investigating different methods or techniques to ensure the roadways are clear and safe for our residents to drive, from plowing more often to utilizing and modifying our pre-treatment brine. It may even be a combination of a few different methods. Any method we use will be decided upon with the safety of our residents in mind.

As always, we will try to keep residents up to speed on any developments as we get closer to the winter.

Help Us With Snowplowing

During the winter season, the snowplow crews ask that you please remove portable basketball hoops from cul-de-sacs or any tree-lawns so the snowplows can clean the streets from curb to curb.

Additionally, if you know a snowstorm is coming or it has already started snowing, please park your vehicles in your driveway if at all possible. This helps the snowplows to better and more efficiently clean your streets so you can safely drive.



PUBLIC WORKS PROJECTS



Cherry Street Roadway Improvement

Cherry Street will be widened to a pavement width of 24 ft., along with curb and gutter, sidewalk on the west side, and storm sewers, from Parker Drive to SR 73. This project is currently out to bid and will be constructed later this fall.

West Central Avenue sidewalk improvements

Sidewalk, curb and gutter, and storm sewers will be installed along the south side of West Central Avenue from Springboro Pointe Shopping Center to just west of Fairway Drive. The sidewalk will connect to the existing walk to the west, to Royal Drive. Rhule Excavating was awarded the project, which began in September and be completed by the end of October.

Water Main Improvements – Pinecone

Construction has begun on replacing an existing 6" water main on Pinecone in the Tamarack Subdivision with new 8" water main. There have been many water main breaks in this area, and the mains require replacement. New 8" water main will be installed along the entire length of Pinecone. The project was awarded to GM Pipeline. Construction is ongoing and will be completed by October.

2014 Street Resurfacing Program

The streets in this year's resurfacing program include: Arcadian Drive, Congressional Place, a portion of Deer Trail Drive, Evergreen Drive (from Whispering Pines to Spruceway), a portion of Greenleaf Village Drive, Jeanne Drive, Paddock Trail, Prestwick Place, Tantara Circle, Timberwood, Whetstone Court, and Whispering Pines. Concrete repairs to the curbs, sidewalk and driveway aprons will also be completed on these streets as a part of this program. The project will begin this fall.

If you see anyone dumping anything into the storm sewer system please contact the Public Works Department at 937-748-9791.

Permits for Building or Remodeling

Any resident wishing to remodel, build or add-on to any structure must first obtain a permit from the City of Springboro Building/Zoning Department. This would include the construction of decks, fences, patio covers, enclosures, accessory buildings, installation of irrigation systems, etc. Any remodeling to existing houses such as basements or any unfinished area in a home requires building plans to be filed with the City along with a building application. Applications may be obtained at 320 West Central Avenue or downloaded from the City of Springboro Web Page (www.ci.springboro.oh.us). The new fee schedule went into effect January 1, 2014

Double fees are charged for work completed without a permit and some work may need to be removed and redone. It is very important to apply for the appropriate permit prior to work being started. Problems have developed when residents put their house on the market without proper inspection records on file with the Building Department.

Residential Building Permits

There have been 44 Residential Building Permits issued as of September of this year. There were 95 new single family permits in 2013. The number of Residential Building Permits over the past fourteen years is shown below:
