City Celebrates 23 Years as Tree City USA

Students from Dennis Elementary School assisted the City of Springboro plant trees at their school in celebration of Arbor Day on April 26. During the ceremony, coordinated by Springboro Park Supervisor Jon Brown, Dennis Elementary Principal Terrah Hunter read a proclamation from Mayor John Agenbrood proclaiming April 26 as Arbor Day in the City of Springboro.

In addition, Mrs. Mary Sillies' third grade class, City Council members Janie Ridd and Becky Iverson, Springboro City Manager Chris Pozzuto and Springboro Schools superintendent Dan Schroer joined other School and City staff members for the event. In all, the City planted five trees around the school. The event also commemorates Springboro's 23rd consecutive year as a Tree City USA.

The City made reforestation, preservation and maintenance of trees a priority in our community by establishing the Tree Authority in 1995. Conceived in 1976, Tree City USA is a national program administered locally by state foresters using four standards to evaluate a community's commitment to its urban forest resource: a tree board or department, a tree-care ordinance, an annual community forestry budget of at least \$2 per capita, and an Arbor Day observance and proclamation.

SUMMER...

...is packed with fun, family events in Springboro! We are looking forward to our second annual Boro BBQ Festival on June 7 & 8 at Clearcreek Park, Doggie Days on July 20 at Hazel Woods Park and Bike the Boro on August 31 at North Park just to name a few. It would not be summer without our popular "Concerts in the Park" at North Park. This year we have booked a record 11 bands offering a variety of music from rock to pop. Concerts begin on Friday, June 21 and continue throughout July with a concert every Tuesday at 7:00 PM and every Friday at 7:30 PM. Friday concerts will again feature a variety of food trucks and beer to enjoy. WRIGHT STATION...

...is under construction! Nearly 50,000 sq. ft. of commercial building space will be developed and marketed for office, retail and restaurant uses over the next four to five years and we are excited about the possibilities! Public improvements have begun with the installation of underground utilities, and an interior roadway system will be constructed to support future Wright Station businesses.

Construction is well underway on our new Performing Arts Center (PAC), which will anchor the site and help spur development. The Performing Arts Center will house the 140-seat *Premier Health Theater* and be the new headquarters for the former Playhouse South theater company. We are happy to announce that Playhouse South has officially changed their name to Springboro Community Theatre (SCT). The city is very excited to collaborate with SCT and their decision to adopt Springboro as their permanent home. CITY PROJECTS

A few projects worth mentioning include the State Route 73 median improvements consisting of new lighting, landscaping and decorative asphalt similar to our downtown crosswalks. When completed, the medians will reduce maintenance costs with a more sustainable design, which will also significantly reduce the need to close lanes for future maintenance. We thank you for your patience during the construction phase of this project.

Improvements on South Pioneer Boulevard began this month and will take approximately five months to complete. The project consists of widening the road, narrowing the medians, and adding a sidewalk

and bike lane leading to Lower Springboro Road. A majority of the construction will take place after 7:00 p.m. to minimize disruptions for the business community operating in the South Pioneer area. Please be aware that if you use South Pioneer to drive to Clearcreek Park expect delays in the evenings while the project is under construction or use Lower Springboro Road as an alternate route to the park.

Finally, construction continues on the 3,000 sq. ft. splash pad and amenities at the city's new Kacie Jane Park at the corner of Lytle-Five Points and Crosley. We plan to open the splash pad just in time for the hot summer weather! "Opening Day" will be announced later this spring.

DRONES...

...are helping us gather traffic data to help alleviate congestion along S. Main Street during the daily school commutes. This past December, City Council approved an agreement with DriveOhio, a collaborative of both public and private entities working to advance smart mobility throughout Ohio. Participation is free and Springboro was the thirteenth and smallest community in Ohio to become a DriveOhio public partner. Columbus, Cleveland and Toledo are also partners.



On April 24, DriveOhio, in partnership with the University of Cincinnati (UC) and the Unmanned Aircraft Systems Group (UAS), flew six drones above State Route 741 during peak

traffic hours to collect comprehensive data on current traffic patterns and traffic congestion issues. UC will analyze the data gathered by the drones and make recommendations based on their findings. The results of the study should help the city determine ways to improve the flow of traffic along S. Main Street using strategies such as better traffic signal coordination during peak traffic. We are very excited to be a local partner in DriveOhio and to find out how smart mobility technology can improve traffic conditions for the safety and convenience of our motorists.

23RD TREE CITY USA AWARD

Springboro received national recognition as a Tree City USA by the Arbor Day Foundation for the 23rd consecutive year thanks to the dedicated efforts of our Tree Authority and city staff to protect this vital natural resource in our community.

Springboro observes Arbor Day each year with a special tree planting ceremony. This year, the city celebrated

Arbor Day on April 26 by planting five new trees at Dennis Elementary School with the help of city officials, volunteers, teachers and students. In addition, we have planted nearly 80 new trees in the past year in our parks and other public spaces.

MEMORIAL DAY...

...is Monday, May 27 and the community is invited to participate in our annual Memorial Day Parade. This year's Grand Marshal is well-known Springboro basketball coach and Vietnam Veteran Wayne Kemper. The parade begins promptly at 2:00 PM on S. Main Street and proceeds to Wade Field for



a brief ceremony. It is a walking parade, with the exception of military vehicles. Groups and individuals interested in joining the parade should meet at the alley and parking lot near Jonathan Wright School at 1:30 p.m. to let the Parade Marshal know you are participating. Complimentary food and refreshments are available following the ceremony in the Springboro Intermediate School cafeteria next to the field.

City Announces Preservation Awards

The City of Springboro announced three recipients for its annual award program recognizing those preserving the City's rich heritage. This recognition is awarded by the Architectural Review Board, a City Council-appointed board that protects Springboro's historic landmarks and promotes local history education. The program was initiated in 2000 and coincides with the National Trust for Historic Preservation's Preservation Month held annually in May. Awards were presented at the May 2, 2019 City Council meeting.

Named for the City's founder, the **Jonathan Wright Award for Historic Preservation** honors those who have restored, rehabilitated or preserved an important building, site or artifact representing the history of the Springboro area, or provided long-term stewardship of such a property or artifact.

Awards were presented to:

Terry and Patty Dudley for their work restoring and maintaining their beautiful home at 415 South Main Street in the Historic District. The Dudleys have owned this 1894 Queen Anne-style home for 30 years and carefully restored and painted the interior and exterior to its current beauty. Parts of the work were funded through grants from the City of Springboro's historic preservation grant program.

Mike Thompson for leading a team of volunteers from the Springboro Area Historical Society and other organizations in repairs to the Society's museum at 110 South Main Street in the Historic District. Thompson and his team replaced wood siding, fascia boards and trim, and repaired, scraped and painted the brick wall on the circa 1810 building.

The Mayor's Award for Preservation Leadership honors those providing leadership and service in support of historic preservation or supporting projects and activities that have substantially increased public understanding and awareness of historic preservation in the Springboro area.

Chris Britton received the award for her work over the past four years as a member of the Springboro Area Historical Society Board of Trustees. She was recognized for her efforts in creative marketing along with innovative fundraising and partnerships with other community organizations transforming the organization to embrace another generation of Springboro residents.

Springboro Clearcreek Baseball Association

Performing Arts Center (PAC) and Wright Station Update

Work continues on the Performing Arts Center (PAC) and the new Wright Station Development at the corner of SR 73 & SR 741. The PAC is scheduled to be complete by the beginning of September. The Springboro Chamber of Commerce, Center Stage Dance Studio and The Springboro Community Theatre Group (SCT) will be occupying the building soon after.

The SCT is hitting the ground running with many performances already scheduled for the new Premier Health Theater, located in the PAC! *The Marvelous Wonderettes* will be showcased September 20-22 & September 27-29 and *Chicago* will be performed November 8-10 & November 15-17. The infrastructure (roads, parking areas, water and sewer lines) continue to be constructed in the Wright Station development just outside of the PAC. The weather in March and April has not been kind to the development work, but Synergy has been making the best of it. Synergy continues to work with local and regional businesses who are interested in locating at the development and we hope to have some exciting news to share in the next few months.



Kacie Jane Park

Work on the Splash Pad and Bathhouse continue at Kacie Jane Park, located at the corner of Lytle-Five Points and Crossley Road. Unfortunately, Mother Nature has not been very kind to the project, as in the month of March, we had 18 rain days that brought work to a screeching halt.

As construction continues, we will update the community on the dedication and open date of the park on all of the city's social media outlets.

In addition to the wonderful donation made by the Hausfeld family to make the park a reality, the City must also thank Clearcreek Township Trustees Ed Wade and Jason Gabbard for recently voting to return \$50,000 per year of City inside-millage property tax monies towards the project over the next 10 years! Kacie Jane Park will be the first joint park project by the City and Clearcreek Township. The township's contribution, in addition to City funds and the donation by the Hausfeld family, will ensure the entire Springboro community will be able to enjoy the park for many years to come.

Recently, the Springboro Police Department unveiled a new crime-prevention and investigation program: **'Boro Street Watch**. The program utilizes residents' security cameras to investigate crimes throughout the City. By registering your security cameras with the police, you are deterring crime, assisting the police in investigations and protecting your family as well as your community.

You can register in two easy steps:

- 1) Call or email the Springboro Police Department at (937) 748-0611 or springborodispatch@cityofspringboro.com or visit our website at www.cityofspringboro.com/FormCenter/Police-Forms-5/Security-Camera-Registration-58
- 2) Provide a few pieces of information that is necessary to register for our PRIVATE database. (An officer can give you tips on which areas would be the best placement for your cameras).

Once you register, you will only be contacted by the police in the future if a criminal incident occurs in the vicinity of your camera(s).

Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan Update Underway

The City's Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan, first adopted in 2013, is being updated. The plan will evaluate progress over the past six years, identify current community priorities and provide recommendations on next steps. City Council members, staff and Bicycle and Pedestrian Advisory Committee (BPAC) members participated in a project kick-off day in April which included an informational session, bike and walking tour and a BPAC meeting. Roadway and Infrastructure Projects



South Pioneer Boulevard to get facelift

Improvements are coming to South Pioneer Boulevard from St. Rt. 73 to Lower Springboro Road. In addition to curb, gutter and sidewalks, the road will be widened

and the medians reduced in size. Additional upgrades include dedicated bike lanes from Pleasant Valley Drive to Lower Springboro Road.

Most of the construction work will be done after rush hour, starting at 7 p.m. If you use South Pioneer in the evening to access Clearcreek Park for youth sports activities, please note that traffic will be maintained, however, you may experience delays. We suggest using Lower Springboro Road from the east to access the park as an alternative route during the duration of this project. Weather permitting, the project should wrap up by late summer.

Medians on St. Rt.73 upgraded

The medians on St. Rt. 73, from the front of the City Building to Clearcreek-Franklin Road are sporting new landscaping that is aesthetically pleasing and maintenance friendly. The new landscaping includes turf, trees and stamped asphalt, giving the area a similar look as the intersection of State Routes 73 and 741.

2019 South Main Street Sidewalk & Curb and Gutter Repairs

Included in the concrete work for the 2019 Street Resurfacing Project is the concrete repairs for South Main Street. The repairs will be from State Route 73 to the south corporation limit. John R. Jurgensen is the contractor.



2019 Street Resurfacing Project

The streets in the 2019 Street Resurfacing Program include: Ambridge Court, Basil Street, Catalpa Drive, Christman Drive, Copley Circle, Curry Drive, Darby Court, Edgebrook Drive, Hollister Court, Manor Drive, Meadows Drive, Paw Paw Drive, Reed Road, Spruceway and West Tech Road. Concrete repairs to the curbs, sidewalk and driveway aprons will also be completed on these streets as a part of this program. The concrete work will begin in May, resurfacing work will begin in the fall and is anticipated to be completed by the end of fall. John R. Jurgensen is the contractor.

Water Main Improvements

The following streets will have water main replacements in 2019: Maple Drive and McVey Place and Renwood Drive from Fairway Drive to Heston Drive. New 8" water mains will be constructed on these streets. There have been many water main breaks in these areas, and the mains require replacement. The new 8" water main will be installed the entire length of each road. The project is in the design phase. Construction is anticipated to start in summer.

2019 Springboro Joint Repair Program

This project will repair the transverse cracks in the roadway throughout the city. Evaluations of street conditions are being performed and a list of streets will be determined. In 2018, the city repaired over 8,000 linear feet of cracks.

Pedestrian Crosswalks at S. Main Street and Market Street

Capital Electric will be installing a new solar powered Pedestrian Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacon at the intersection of South Main Street and Market Street. The poles are currently on order and construction is expected to be this summer.

Water tower gets a fresh look

The Springboro water tower on E. Lytle-Five Points Road is getting a makeover that includes interior cleaning, painting and inspections. This project should be completed by early summer and will not affect water flow in any way. The work is being done in advance of the opening of the Kacie Jane Park.



Permits for Building or Remodeling

Any resident wishing to remodel, build or add-on to any structure must first obtain a permit from the City of Springboro Building/Zoning Department. This would include the construction of decks, fences, patio covers, enclosures, accessory buildings, installation of irrigation systems, etc. Any remodeling to existing houses such as basements or any unfinished area in a home requires building plans to be filed with the City along with a building application. Applications may be obtained at 320 West Central Avenue or downloaded from the City of Springboro Web Page (www.ci.springboro.oh.us). **The new fee schedule went into effect January 1, 2018.**

Double fees are charged for work completed without a permit and some work may need to be removed and redone. It is very important to apply for the appropriate permit prior to work being started. Problems have developed when residents put their house on the market without proper inspection records on file with the Building Department.

Play it safe! Digging into a live electric or gas line may cause injury or worse. Plan ahead. At least 48 hours before planting a shrub or tree, setting posts for a deck or installing an irrigation system, call 811 (or 1-800-362-2764) for utility locations– it's the law! OHIO811 doing business as Ohio Utility Protection Service (OUPS) is a free service that will contact utility companies to visit your property to mark their respective underground lines. Then you will know where to dig to avoid hitting a buried utility line. For more information, visit oups.org.

“Are We Lowering Our Expectations for Our Water Quality?”

Here in the Miami Valley we are blessed with abundant drinking water from the Great Miami Buried Valley Aquifer and we naturally assume it's going to be clean and available whenever we need it. *But, is it reasonable for us to assume this?* There are more people now than ever, and trying to keep something as mobile and pervasive as water away from all the potential pollutants that people generate on a daily basis is a pretty tall order to fill.



Our daily activities such as the *fertilizer and weed killer we use to keep the yard looking nice, the salt we put on the sidewalk so we don't fall on the ice, the old medicine we put down the toilet, the litter we see in parking lots, the microplastic fibers from our synthetic clothes when we wash them, or even where we choose to put our yard waste* are just a few of the daily challenges our water quality faces. Sure, we have several agencies to protect and treat our water but, *is it realistic to think they can do it all?*

We have found types and quantities of pollutants in our water resources for quite some time.

Because of this, these agencies' standards for water quality have gone from testing for the presence of pollutants, to testing if the amount of pollutions they are finding “meets safe drinking water levels”.

Have our water quality standards lowered from expecting crystal clean water to establishing “thresholds for human tolerances” of the pollutants we are continuing to find? Have we, as citizens, lowered our standard for what we expect from our water quality? Are we past the expectation that our water should be free from human-based pollution?

Standards of anything start to lower when you don't make something a priority. *And what could be more of a priority than having clean water?* With so many of us living our busy everyday lives, it is not realistic to think that a handful of agencies can protect our water from everything we as citizens throw at it, because *we (and our activities) are everywhere and so is our water.*

If we are *not* past the expectation of wanting pollution-free water (instead of finding thresholds of our human pollution tolerance) then it is time for us to start ***making our water quality our priority in our daily lives.***

Many hands makes light work and there is power in numbers! Wherever you live your life is where you can help keep the water clean, everyday. It isn't complicated, hard or expensive. Just making small adjustments in our daily activities is all it takes to safeguard our water for now and the future.

WE are the resources that are needed for making clean water a priority!

- Participate in your local government decisions concerning your water resources
- Report people who are polluting the water
- Use organic (or no) lawn care chemicals. Dandelions, clover and violets are an important honeybee food
- Never put or hose anything down a storm drain
- Support restaurants, cleaners, mechanic shops who recycle their oil and use water-friendly chemicals
- Buy organic clothing and food
- Keep drainage ways vegetated
- Test your soil for nutrients before adding fertilizer and never fertilize before or during a rain
- Plant a tree
- Make sure your cars, lawn equipment and trash cans have no leaks
