Fiber to Home Project Continues to Grow

As part of the City's Fiber Master Plan, construction on the 17-mile fiber optic loop with six conduits is complete. This \$2.4 million investment in the digital future is a partnership with the Warren County Port Authority to build a broadband fiber network to provide high-speed internet service to Springboro homes and businesses.

The City will not be providing internet services, however, this investment in a fiber network has attracted two Internet Service Providers (ISPs) that have collectively purchased five of those conduits—that will provide internet service options for residents and businesses. In addition, the City's sale of the fiber lines has covered a majority of the fiber optic loop installation. Point Broadband began installing its lines last year and is wrapping up work in neighborhoods. Alta Fiber (formerly Cincinnati Bell) purchased four lines from the City and is set to begin work later this summer with an expected completion date by the end of next year.

The internet providers run their own fiber optic cables to provide high speed internet to neighborhoods. Residents should expect to see construction teams and equipment for both ISPs throughout the City completing necessary aerial and underground work.

Both ISPs will notify residents via a door hanger before crews begin work in that area.

In addition to providing options to residents and businesses for high speed internet, the technology upgrades will help the City provide better safety, communication and public works services.

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Preservation Awards Presented at City Council Meeting

City Council recognized the 2022 recipients of the Architectural Review Board's Historic Preservation awards at the May 19 council meeting. The Springboro Area Historical Society received the Mayor's Award for Preservation Leadership for its work in updating the Historical Museum at 110 S. Main St. in the Historic District. Updates focused on improving how Springboro's history is told through in-museum technological improvements that extend the museum's message beyond its four walls. Additional updates included a capital campaign, improved lighting and the installation of new exhibits.

Property owner Betty Bray, along with Leslie and Todd Moss, owners of shoppe smitten, received the Jonathan Wright Award for Historic Preservation for the transformation of the circa 1883 building at 200 S. Main St. into smitten home, a furnishing store. Work included new signage, new exterior paint scheme, property clean-up and updates to the store interior, all respecting the historic aspects of the property. City Council member Janie Ridd, Council liaison to the ARB, and Matt Leedy, chair of the City's Architectural Review Board, presented the awards.





Legislative Update

Your City Council Members meet monthly at 7 p.m. on the first and third Thursday in Council Chambers to pass legislation and authorize budgeted expenditures related to the management and operation of our City and the health, safety and welfare of our citizens. Here are just a few agenda items recently approved by City Council:

- An ordinance amending the City's code to comply with requirements set forth by the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency. The City's storm water ordinances have been updated to be consistent with Ohio EPA regulations to further the protection of our storm water system.
- An agreement with the Ohio Department of Natural Resources for a grant to fund recreational trail development in the City. This \$150,000 grant partially funds the construction of a 10 ft.-wide multi-use, off-road trail connecting Clearcreek Park to Hazel Woods Park. This new trail is part of the implementation of the City's Central Greenway plan and construction is anticipated in 2023.
- A new Coterminous Boundary and Recreation Agreement with Clearcreek Township to assist the Clearcreek Fire District with the development of a new fire station. Through a needs and operational assessment, the fire district identified the need for a new fire station to better serve the northwest portion of Springboro. The City has partnered with Clearcreek Township by agreeing to purchase the land necessary to facilitate the construction of the new fire station and the township has agreed to extend inside millage payments to the City for park and leisure services to the year 2041. The new coterminous agreement replaces a previous agreement, which expired in 2028.
- Property on Gardner Road within the Village Park Development was identified as the best location for the new fire station and an agreement was approved to purchase the property. This location will provide the most efficient and effective response times to the residents and businesses in that area of the City ensuring our community continues to have the best safety services possible. Although the City will own the property, the fire district will be responsible for construction, operation and maintenance of the new fire station.
- An ordinance enacting a new Chapter 828 called "Canvassing, Peddling, Soliciting: Do Not Contact List." This ordinance establishes certain regulations for door-to-door solicitors of goods and services. Under the new ordinance, solicitors are required to obtain a license subject to a background check and \$25 fee. This ordinance restricts door-to-door sales to the hours of 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. and establishes a "Do Not Contact List," which prohibits solicitors from making door-to-door contact at any residences on the list. Solicitors must carry the "Do Not Contact List," the required license and a photo ID when making door-to-door calls.
- An ordinance authorizing the full repayment of the City's outstanding sewer system mortgage revenue bonds in the amount of \$4,875,000. The early payoff of the bonds will produce approximately \$663,750 in interest savings over the remaining life of the bonds.

Register for Weather Alerts

Springboro residents have the opportunity to opt-in to receive automated severe weather alerts via a cell phone. The opt-in service will automatically notify enrollees of tornado, flash flood and severe thunderstorm warnings just moments after an alert has been issued by The National Weather Service (NWS)—allowing residents to take immediate action.

The Miami Valley Communications Council recently upgraded its CodeRED system to include CodeRED Weather Warning for its participating cities—including Springboro—in order to provide residents and businesses with these automated severe weather alerts.

To receive severe weather warnings, residents and businesses must first visit Springboro's CodeRED enrollment page at <https://www.cityofspringboro.com/160/CodeRED-Emergency-Alert-System>.

Individuals are encouraged to enter both a cell phone number and email address as well as select the types of weather warnings they want to receive.

CodeRED Weather Warning's advanced technology is designed to quickly notify residents in the direct path of projected weather as issued by the National Weather Service.

Residents already enrolled in the free service should check that their contact information is current.

Be a Good Neighbor, Keep Fido on a Leash

Experience the Seasonal Changes of Nature

See the wonder of nature as the season changes. The City and Park Board have three nature hikes on tap led by Lynn Johnson, Ohio Certified Volunteer Naturalist and Springboro resident.

Sunday, July 24, 2–3 p.m. Hike at Gardner Park. This hike will look at the large trees in the park as well as the wildlife which needs such habitat. In addition, visit the Veterans Memorial. While the hike is flat, there could be mud on the trails.

Sunday, Aug. 28 and Sunday, Sept. 11, 2–3:30 p.m. Hike through the Prairie at E. Milo Beck Park. Look at the flowers which bloom in late summer and early fall on this restored prairie. The prairie paths are flat but there is quite a bit of elevation change from the parking lot and overlook to the prairie. This hike could be as long as 2.5 miles. Shelters Available at Four Parks

Our City parks host six shelters, five of which can be reserved at no charge. Community Park has three shelters while Clearcreek and North parks each have one shelter. The shelter at Kacie Jane Park is not available for reservations.

Community and Clearcreek park shelters are available April 1–Oct. 31. North Park and Kacie Jane Park shelters are available year-round.

Park shelter use is permitted only during regular park hours of operation: dawn until dusk. Shelters must be reserved on our website, www.ci.springboro.oh.us. You may reserve a date beginning the first business day in January for that year. Reservations are done on a first-come, first-served basis. Bike the Boro and the Big Event Planned for North Park

Free cycling event and kids' activities set for Saturday, Sept. 3

The City of Springboro hosts the 9th annual Bike the Boro and Big Event 10 a.m.–1 p.m., Saturday, Sept. 3 at North Park, 195 Tamarack Trail. Bike the Boro features 2, 10 and 16-mile rides, giving cyclists of all ages and levels the opportunity to ride throughout the City. Bicycle helmet giveaways and helmet fittings along with exhibitors including bike shops and bicycle education will also be a part of the event. Stick around for The Big Event! North Park will be filled with bounce houses, exhibits and equipment from the Springboro Police, Clearcreek Fire and Warren County SWAT. City Council Reviewing DORA Extension

City Council is looking at extending the Designated Outdoor Refreshment Area to include downtown Historic Springboro. Wright Station, the development at Main and Central avenues, was designated as a DORA in 2020. Since that time, several downtown business owners have expressed interest in expanding the DORA south along Main Street. In June, the City held a community meeting with residents and business owners from the downtown area to discuss an extension.

A DORA allows patrons over the age of 21 to purchase alcoholic beverages in specially marked cups from an establishment and carry them within a clearly defined area. Wright Station's DORA includes the area around Warped Wing, The Performing Arts Center, Heroes and Cassano's—all liquor permit holders. The Springboro Community Theatre holds the permit for the PAC.

Should the City decide to move forward with the extension, an ordinance is expected to go before City Council as early as this summer. The DORA would extend down S. Main Street to Mill Street and include Springboro United Church of Christ and Midwest Wealth Management.

At present, there are two downtown businesses with liquor permits and each would have the option to sell alcohol. Other businesses would have the option whether to permit the alcohol on their premises, and notification would be done through uniform signage, provided by the City.

According to Assistant City Manager Greg Shackelford, a DORA is an economic development tool that many cities are utilizing. "The DORA allows for patrons to eat, drink, enjoy entertainment and shop all in one location." He says Wright Station's DORA has been very popular and encourages residents to stop by the park area to enjoy small outdoor concerts and other entertainment.



Bike Events on City Streets

Springboro's Bicycle & Pedestrian Advisory Committee (BPAC) in partnership with three local businesses sponsor three remaining 10-mile bike rides on City streets this summer. Meet at Mr. Boro's Tavern on July 18, Crooked Handle Brewing Company hosts Sept. 20, and ride with Warped Wing on Aug. 16. All rides start at 6:30 p.m.



Permits Needed for Building or Remodeling

Residents planning to remodel, build or add-on to any structure must first obtain a permit from the City of Springboro Building/Zoning Department. This would include the construction of decks, fences, patio covers, enclosures, accessory buildings, installation of irrigation systems, and the like. Any remodeling to existing houses such as basements or any unfinished area in a home requires building plans to be filed with the City along with a building application. Applications may be obtained at 320 W. Central Ave. or downloaded from the City website, www.ci.springboro.oh.us. The new fee schedule went into effect on January 1, 2022.



Double fees are charged for work completed without a permit and some work may need to be removed and redone. It is very important to apply for the appropriate permit prior to work being started. Problems have developed when residents put their house on the market without proper inspection records on file with the Building Department. Contact the Building/Zoning Department, 937-748-9791, with questions.

Roadway and Infrastructure Projects

Our annual street program kicks off soon. This year 23 streets will be resurfaced along with repairs to curbs, sidewalk and driveway aprons. The City has committed \$1.47 million to this project.

Streets in the Resurfacing Program include: Greenwood Lane, South Pioneer Blvd. (from SR 73 to the south exit of the Post Office), Dogwood Court and Evergreen Drive (extending approximately 300 feet in each direction from the intersection of Dogwood Court), Lemonwood Court, Foliage Drive (from Whispering Pines to Tamarack Trail), Heston Drive (from the intersection of Fairway Drive to the east), Stillwater Court, Wedgewood Court, Pembroke Court, Millbrook Court, Springmill Drive (from Reed Road to Millbrook Court), Arbor Hills Drive, Balsam Court, Timbermill Court, Lexington Court, Brighton Court, Beckley Farm Way (from Beckworth Way to the west), Pasture Court, Wheatmore Court, Edinburgh Drive, Devon Court, E. Market Street, E. State Street, E. Factory Road, E. South Street and the north/south alley on the east side of S. Main Street. Work also includes concrete repairs to curbs, sidewalk and driveway aprons. Construction is anticipated to begin this summer and completed by early fall.

2022 Water Main Improvements

New 8" water mains will be constructed on Fairway Drive from W. Central Ave. to Sesame Street to replace aging and deteriorating 6" water main. In addition, Fairway Drive will be widened from W. Central Ave. to just north of Nutmeg Square. Construction start date is dependent on material availability.



Springboro Celebrates 26 Years as Tree City USA

First grade students from Clearcreek Elementary School along with their principal, Mrs. Carrie Corder, helped Springboro Deputy Mayor Becky Iverson celebrate Arbor Day by planting a Red Maple tree near the playground at their school. Deputy Mayor Iverson read a proclamation announcing April 28 as Arbor Day in the City of Springboro. This marks Springboro's 26th year of being designated a Tree City USA by the National Arbor Foundation.

The City continues to meet the guidelines to earn our 26th annual distinction as a Tree City USA. Conceived in 1976, Tree City USA is a national program administered locally by state foresters using four standards to evaluate a community's commitment to its urban forest resource: a tree board or department, a tree-care ordinance, an annual community forestry budget of at least \$2 per capita, and an Arbor Day observance and proclamation.

The City made reforestation, preservation and maintenance of trees a priority in our community by establishing the Tree Authority in 1995. Sit back and relax under the shade of a beautiful tree!

City Receives Grant for Multiuse Trail

The City received a \$150,000 grant from the Ohio Department of Natural Resources to help fund the construction of a 10 ft.-wide multiuse, off-road trail connecting Clearcreek Park to Hazel Woods Park. This trail will eventually connect to the City of Franklin's bike trail system. Construction is expected to start next year. By the end of 2023, the project will connect 3.5 miles of trails under development in Springboro and Franklin that will extend to near downtown Franklin.

The trail connection is a recommendation from the City's 2020 Bicycle & Pedestrian Plan, that will eventually connect six Springboro parks and City trails with the Miami Valley regional system of 350 miles of trails, the nation's largest paved trail network.

Construction is complete on a 2,500-foot multiuse trail that connects E. Milo Beck Park to Clearcreek Park, pictured above. That project received \$250,000 in grant funding from the state of Ohio. Both parks are located on Lower Springboro Road.

Following are responses for some Frequently Asked Questions. Visit the City website, www.ci.springboro.oh.us, for more information about the Fiber Master Plan, FAQs and ISP options.

Q: Point Broad Band has already installed lines in my yard. Can Alta Fiber use those lines?

A: Each ISP has its own lines that must be installed individually.

Q: Why is there construction in my yard? I never gave permission.

A: Just like all utility companies, Alta Fiber and Point Broadband have the right to access the City's Right-Of-Way (ROW)—which typically extends across streets from sidewalk to sidewalk—and easement areas typically located along the street, the sidewalk, the rear lot line or between two lots. Alta Fiber and Point Broadband crews have legal access to these areas to install their fiber-optic cables in addition to equipment such as boxes buried at ground level, typically placing them in a central location utilized by multiple utility providers. Point Broadband and Alta Fiber have obtained all necessary permits to build their respective fiber networks.

Q: I don't want high speed internet. Do they have to come in my yard?

A: As stated above, these utility companies have the right to access the City's Right-of-Way to build a city-wide fiber-optic network in Springboro. You are not obligated to use their services. As with other utilities (electric, gas, etc.), the goal is to make this service as widely accessible as possible, however, there is no requirement for any home to sign up for their service.

Q: The construction crew damaged my lawn, fence or other areas. Who do I contact?

A: Crews do their best to minimize the impact to property. However, accidents do occur. Please note that construction is temporary and the impact to property should be limited as most infrastructure lines will be underground. Contact either ISPs with questions or concerns. Q: Point Broadband just left my neighborhood. What is the construction timeline for Alta Fiber?

A: Construction will begin in the next few months with services beginning to roll out by the end of 2023.

Q: Can I remove the small flags in my yard?

A: Please do not remove the flags as they show where the other utilities are located. Point Broadband and Alta Fiber are legally required to have other utilities located and marked/flagged during construction, to eliminate hitting electric, cable or gas lines. Once construction work is completed on your property, the construction crew will remove the flags.

Q: How can I get more information about signing up for service?

Solicitation Ordinance in Effect

All solicitors are required to obtain a license subject to a background check, pay a \$25 fee and restrict hours for door-to-door sales from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. In addition, the City maintains a "Do Not Solicit List", which prohibits solicitors from making door-to-door contact with any addresses on the list. Solicitors are required to carry the list, the required license and a photo ID when making door-to-door calls.



The ordinance does not affect youth fundraising activities like school, sport or scout sales. Nor does it affect door-to-door political campaigns, collection of signatures or distribution of brochures or other literature. It does affect peddlers and solicitors selling for a profit; for example door-to-door salespersons for landscaping, pest control and roofing companies would all need to have a solicitor's license.

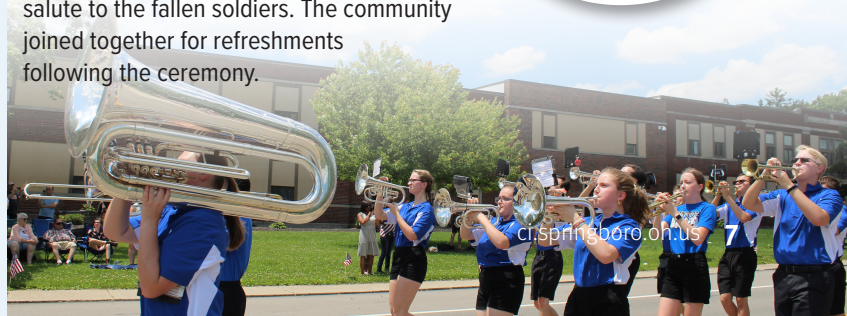
Residents who choose to be a part of the Do Not Solicit List, can register on the City website, www.ci.springboro.oh.us. The registration is valid until a resident changes addresses.

Should a resident have a solicitor at the door without the required license or if a solicitor comes to your door and your address is included on the Do Not Solicit list, please call the Springboro Police Department, 937-748-0611.

25-year police veteran serves as grand marshal for Memorial Day parade

He has served 21 years as a DARE Ohio Board member, including leadership roles as vice president and president. In 2013, Sgt. Wilson was named DARE Officer of the Year by DARE America.

Springboro Chief of Police Jeff Kruithoff attended the recognition event and says Sgt. Wilson is always willing to spend time with students to provide assistance and support. "Sgt. Wilson is a huge part of the fabric of the Springboro School District," says Chief Kruithoff. "His collaboration with school counselors has helped a large number of students successfully transition through their school experience into adulthood."

Home Safety Checklist

We're fortunate to live in a safe community. However, crimes of opportunity make it easy for thieves. Follow these safety tips from the Springboro Police Department:

- ✓ Keep your garage door closed. Police often investigate complaints about golf clubs, gardening tools and beer being stolen from the garage.
- ✓ Secure side doors and windows leading into your garage.
- ✓ Lock the door leading from your garage into your home.
- ✓ Park locked vehicles near the garage door and close to illumination.
- ✓ Take car keys with you—don't leave them in the ignition.
- ✓ Hide your valuables and lock your vehicle.
- ✓ Return bicycles, tools and other items to the garage. Don't leave them in the yard.
- ✓ Call the Springboro Police Department immediately if you witness a crime or something suspicious. Call 911 to report a crime in progress.

Be Prepared for Emergency Situations

National Preparedness Month is recognized each September to promote family and community disaster planning now and throughout the year. Prepare for an emergency event like a weather incident that could cause you to be self-reliant for three days without utilities and electricity, water service, access to a grocery store or local services and possibly without response from police, fire or rescue.

- Make a family emergency communication plan and include your pets.
- Identify an out of town emergency contact to coordinate information with family/friends.
- Keep an emergency kit wherever you spend time: home, car, work, etc.
- Download the FEMA app and set up local alerts.
- Practice your preparedness plans with a drill or exercise.
- Take time to learn lifesaving skills—such as CPR and First Aid, check your insurance policies and coverage for the hazards you may face, such as flood, earthquakes, and tornadoes.
- Consider the costs associated with disasters and save for an emergency.
- Know how to take practical safety steps like shutting off water and gas.

Library Set for Expansion

The Franklin-Springboro Public Library has announced that the Springboro branch will be renovating and repurposing existing areas of the building and adding a 4,500 sq. foot addition to the rear of the building.

The Springboro branch was built in 1989. Today, Springboro's population has far exceeded the scope of what the library was built to facilitate. The branch hosts an average of 40 programs a month and provides free meeting space to the community, so the new square footage will be devoted to including a larger meeting room for big groups and programs, a conference room, and four study rooms. The children's area will also double in size to offer a larger collection for younger patrons.

Springboro City Council transferred its 50 percent interest in the library's property to the library board allowing the library to pursue an expansion project.

Construction is slated to begin in late summer and be completed in the summer of 2023. While services and accessibility will vary during construction, the Library plans to remain open as much as possible.
