Activities already planned include a film series, public art project, tree planting honoring early pioneers' sugar camps, recognition of 18 Revolutionary War veterans who became founding families, a short production about the Null family's journey to Clear Creek and their home—located on what is now a part of Heatherwoode golf course, and special events on July 4th! New City Council Member Brings Lifetime of Service

Springboro's newest City Council member, **Jerry Ferris**, may be new to the role, but he has been an active part of the community since moving to the City's "Spice Rack" neighborhood in 1979. Jerry now represents **Ward 1** on City Council.

A Vietnam veteran and three-time Purple Heart recipient, Jerry went on to a 27-year career with AK Steel, becoming its first African American professional. Since 2014, he has led the **Warren County Veterans Service Commission**, earning induction into the Ohio Veterans Hall of Fame in 2025.



Originally from Cincinnati, Jerry and his wife, Darlene—his sweetheart since their marriage in 1974—have lived in their Springboro home 47 years. They have one son, Rodney, a U.S. Navy veteran and Southwest Airlines pilot, who lives in Utah with his wife Shevon and their three children. Jerry and Darlene enjoy visiting often.

For more than three decades, Jerry has championed veterans—serving with the Military Order of the Purple Heart, helping establish Purple Heart Cities, and securing Wright-Patterson Air Force Base as the first active-duty Purple Heart installation. He looks forward to continuing his community service on City Council.



Legislative Update

Your City Council meets at 7 p.m. on the first and third Thursday of each month in Council Chambers to pass legislation and authorize expenditures that support the daily operations of our City and the health, safety and welfare of our residents.

In 2025, City Council voted on more than 90 legislative items related to capital improvements, planning and zoning, economic development, finance and general policy matters. Here are a few highlights of recent meetings:

- **Cyber-Security Plan Adopted:** City Council approved a **Cyber-Security Plan** in compliance with Ohio Revised Code Chapter 9.64, which now requires all local governments to have a plan protecting their computer systems. This ensures that Springboro's technology infrastructure meets new state standards and safeguards vital city data.
- **Wastewater Treatment Plant Generator Replacement:** Council awarded a contract to Glenwood Electric, Inc. to **replace the 20-year-old backup generator** at the Wastewater Treatment Plant. The \$947,273.80 project will ensure reliable operations during power outages.
- **Trail Connection Feasibility Study:** Springboro entered into a Local Public Agency Safety Study agreement with the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) to study the **feasibility of a multi-use trail connecting Community Park to North Park.** The project supports the 2020 Bicycle



& Pedestrian Plan and advances the development of the Springboro Greenway, linking six city parks and connecting to regional trails.

- **Warren County Hazard Mitigation Plan:** The City continues to partner with the Warren County Emergency Management Agency on the **Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation 5-Year Plan.** This federally required plan helps communities prepare for and reduce the impacts of natural disasters such as flooding, tornadoes and severe storms—keeping Springboro eligible for federal mitigation grants.
- **Federal FAST Act Funding Applications:** Springboro has applied for Federal Fast Act funds through the Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission. If approved, these funds will **resurface Lytle-Five Points Road from St. Rt. 741 to Hickory Hills Drive in 2030** and construct a **shared-use path from Factory Road to Community Park in 2031.**
- **Business First! Program Membership Renewed:** Council renewed the City's participation in the Business First! Program through 2030. This regional business retention and expansion initiative connects Springboro to more than 80 area partners, providing resources like **job training, low-interest loans and support for local companies.**
- **2026 Budget and Capital Improvement Program:** City Council approved the 2026 Annual Budget in November, authorizing **\$82.8 million** in operational and capital expenditures to maintain essential services, improve infrastructure and invest in Springboro's future.

Experience the Seasonal Changes of Nature

See the wonders of nature as the seasons change. The City and Park Board will sponsor nature walks at three City parks this year. Walks are led by Springboro resident Lynn Johnson, an Ohio Certified volunteer Naturalist. Each walk is scheduled for a Sunday afternoon. **Meet at 2 p.m. near the park sign.** As part of our America250 celebration, activities such as measuring the age of trees and their history will be included.

The winter walk will explore how wildlife, both plants and animals, adapt to winter in Ohio. Meet at E. Milo Beck Park on Lower Springboro Road to hike the prairie and the riparian corridor along Clear Creek. Date: Jan. 11

The spring walks will focus on spring wildflower and explore other seasonal changes in the natural surroundings at North Park, 195 Tamarack Trail. Dates: March 29, April 12, April 19 and April 26

The summer walks will take place at two parks. Focus on big trees, wildlife and visit the Veterans Memorial at **Gardner Park**, Village Park Blvd.: July 19

See flowers and explore the prairie at **E. Milo Beck Park**, Lower Springboro Road: Aug. 30 and Sept. 13


City Crews Keep Roads Clear

Springboro's Public Service Department has already battled snow storms this season. Our crews work to provide quality services so motorists can safely travel our roadways. So what is our process for clearing ice and snow?

1. Major arteries (St. Rt. 73, St. Rt. 741, Pennyroyal, Lytle-Five Points) are plowed first. We must keep roads clear for emergency vehicles, and conditions may require continued treatment.
2. Once major arteries are cleared, our crews move on to main streets and through subdivisions.
3. Residential streets, cul-de-sacs and courts will be serviced once the major arteries and main roads are cleared. Please help us by removing basketball hoops and parking your cars in the driveway. This allows the snowplows to better and more efficiently clean your streets so you can safely drive on them.

Check Traffic Before You Go

Check out live road conditions and traffic situations 24/7 from the City website. The City has three live-streaming traffic cameras at the following intersections: St. Rt. 741 at Lytle-Five Points, St. Rt. 741 and St. Rt. 73, and St. Rt. 73 at Drug Mart. Visit cityofspringboro.gov and scroll down the main page to Traffic Cameras to see a live feed of the traffic.



Roadway and Infrastructure Projects

This year 20 streets will be resurfaced along with repairs to curbs, sidewalks and driveway aprons. The City has committed \$1.88 million to this project.

2026 Street Resurfacing Program

Streets include Andover Drive, Bayberry Court, Bateman Court, Cinnamon Court, Commercial Way, East Manor Drive, East Waterbury Drive, Great Oak Drive, Jacamar Court, Juanita Court, Mill Run Lane, Millard Court, North Lakeshore Drive, Settlers Walk Boulevard, Springhouse Drive,

Springwood Drive, South Lakeshore Drive, Village Drive, West Longmeadow Drive and West Waterbury Drive. Concrete repairs to curbs, sidewalks and driveway aprons are also scheduled.

2026 Water Main Improvements

New 8" water mains are being designed for Sesame Street and Heston Drive to replace aging and deteriorating 6" water mains. These streets will be a part of the 2027 Street Resurfacing Program. Construction is expected this summer.


Springboro Has Lowest Property Tax in the Region

Springboro residents enjoy some of the most affordable property taxes in the region, making our city a standout choice for homeowners. Our municipal tax rate of **1.1 mills** ensures that your hard-earned money goes further.

Property tax is based on the amount charged per \$1,000 worth of taxable property value, also known as “millage”, and supports local services like schools, libraries and public health. The County Treasurer and Auditor ensure these funds are responsibly distributed to serve residents effectively.

The City of Springboro portion of the charged millage in 2025 was, on average, **89.1% lower than the neighboring communities charged millage**. The chart shows each jurisdiction listed by their unique millage charge.

Do Not Solicit Registration Available

The City maintains a Do Not Solicit List that prohibits licensed solicitors from contacting any address on the list. **Residents can register online** through the City website: cityofspringboro.gov. Registration remains valid **until the resident changes addresses**.

Solicitor Requirements

All solicitors **must obtain a City license**, which includes:

- A **background check**
- A **\$25 fee**
- **Restricted solicitation hours:** 9 a.m.–7 p.m.

Solicitors are required to **carry**:

- Their **solicitor's license**
- **Photo ID**
- The current **Do Not Solicit List**

Exemptions

The ordinance **does not apply** to:

- Youth fundraising (for example, schools, sports teams, Scouts)
- Political campaigning
- Signature collection or distribution of brochures/literature

It **does apply** to commercial sales for profit, such as

- Landscaping services
- Pest control
- Roofing or home repair sale

Reporting Violations

If a solicitor **lacks a license** or your address is on the **Do Not Solicit List** and you are still approached, please contact the **Springboro Police Department** at **937-748-0611**.

TAX SEASON 2026 IS HERE Catch the Filing Wave!

What do 1,200 Springboro taxpayers have in common? They all used **LIME**, the City's online filing application, to file their 2024 tax return last year. And, they did it for three basic reasons:

1. **It's fast**—typically takes less than five minutes to file
2. **It's convenient**—you can file from the comfort of your home or from your phone
3. **It's accurate**—there's no guesswork; just upload the tax documents LIME requests and the program will do all the calculations for you

LIME will be available to taxpayers filing 2025 returns beginning Feb. 16. To access LIME when it's time to file, go to www.lime.springborotax.com.

Remember the Basics


- The City's tax deadline is **April 30, 2026**.
- If you are 18 years of age or older you generally need to file a City return. For more information on filing requirements, consult the Tax Services page on the City's website.
- Your Federal return must be complete before your City return can be prepared.
- City staff will prepare your return free of charge in our office, **but this service is available by appointment only**. Schedule online or call 937-748-9701 to reserve a spot. Appointments fill fast, so make yours early!
- Help is just an email, taxdept@cityofspringboro.com, or phone call, 937-748-9701, away, 8 a.m.–4:30 p.m. Monday–Friday. Staff can typically reply to messages within 24 hours. But please be patient if you're contacting us during the peak of tax season, April 1–30; responses could take up to 2 to 3 business days.

New Memorial Planned for Gardner Park

Fundraising efforts continue for the **Vietnam Veterans Remembrance Memorial** at Gardner Park, 181 Village Park Blvd. This memorial will honor the bravery, service and sacrifice of Vietnam veterans while also sharing the story of the war's impact on the citizens of Vietnam. It will serve as a place of reflection, remembrance, and education for generations to come.

The project is the vision of Springboro resident and business owner **Daklak Do**, who fled Vietnam in the late 1970s and has long dreamed of creating a lasting tribute.

Fall Election Results

Springboro's four ward City Council seats were elected in November. Returning to their seats are **Dale Brunner** in Ward 2, **Jack Hanson** in Ward 3 and **Jim Chmiel** in Ward 4. **Jerry Ferris** will represent Ward 1, filling the seat vacated by Janie Ridd, who announced her retirement from public service and chose not to run. For more on Jerry Ferris, see page 1.

In addition, **voters passed the Springboro Schools 2.8 mills bond issue**, paving the way for \$115 million to be used on four main projects but will not increase current taxes. Planned projects include:

1. A new PreK-2 elementary school built on the Easton Farm site that will include full-day kindergarten. Once the building is complete, the City will take ownership of Clearcreek Elementary and the Jonathan Wright property.
2. Additional science classrooms and cafeteria upgrades at Springboro Junior High School
3. A new multi-use athletics complex at Springboro High School
4. New access to Dennis Elementary and the high school from Weidner Road
5. Various district wide upgrades including safety/security and technology improvements

Recommended Safety Kit Items


